Each week, your child will be given the following:

Maths

- Times Tables Rockstars - Children should practise their multiplication and division facts by using their Times Tables Rockstars account 5 times a week. This is a fantastic resource that will help the children to build their confidence and speed in recalling these facts. The children have their own unique logins. <https://trockstars.com/>
- Mathletics - Children will be set at least 1 Maths activity per week linked to their Maths Learning in class. The children have their own unique logins. <https://www.mathletics.com/uk/>. This will be set each Wednesday and will be due the following Wednesday.

English

- Spellings - New spellings are issued to the children each Wednesday. These can be found on the Year 2 Google Classroom, that all children have access to. There is a list of spellings which children are expected to be able to spell correctly by the end of Key Stage 1. They are all incorporated into the weekly spellings and are revisited throughout the year. Your child will practise spellings at school but they also need to practise them at home.
Weekly spellings will be tested every Wednesday and your child will be aware of their score.
- Reading - We ask that the children read as often as possible with an adult/older sibling (at least four times a week). Reading books are changed in school every Monday and Thursday, as long as the previous book has been read twice - this should be evidence in your child's reading record with a comment and signature. Please encourage your child to read a wide range of texts (both fiction and non-fiction) as this will greatly help them to learn new or challenging vocabulary.

Project Homework

- Optional project homework will be set each term via Google Classroom. These will link to the children's current Cornerstones topic. The projects are a wonderful opportunity for families to work together and enjoy some shared learning! Class teachers will share a termly due date for these projects and a certificate will be issued on completion.

Assessments

At Benhurst, we assess children as part of our daily teaching through general observations of their learning and ongoing discussions. These daily interactions with your child are used to inform our planning and to develop your child's learning.

In year 2 we will be assessing the children's phonics through the Phonics Screening Check. Cancellation of the phonics screening check in June 2021 means incoming year 2 pupils did not take the check in year 1. In the 2021 to 2022 academic year, it is statutory for schools to administer a past version of the phonics screening check to year 2 pupils during the second half of the 2021 autumn term and return results to their local authority. The exact date of the Phonics Screening Check is to follow. The children will also be assessed through the end of Key Stage 1 SATs. The children will sit three tests: reading; maths; grammar, punctuation and spelling. The results from these tests will be used, along side class-based teacher assessment, to support the children as they enter Key Stage 2. The exact date of the year 2 SATs is to follow; however, we know it will be during the Summer Term. There will also be a SATs meeting for parents to attend in the Spring Term, the date of this is also to follow.

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Gaming and Social Media



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In recent years, we have seen an increase in the number of children using social media and computer games aimed at a mainly teenage audience. This can cause issues at home and school and it is important that parents are aware of what their child is using and monitors it very closely.

For example, we know of children as young as 7 who have access to Fortnite, Call of Duty and GTA. To illustrate our concern, GTA is a game based on gang violence using knives and guns, stealing, nudity, extremely coarse language, alcohol abuse, stealing and selling illegal drugs, prostitution and breaking and entering. As parents, we would ask you to consider the boundaries you set for your children. For those who believe such games appropriate for their child at a primary age, I would ask if you would be comfortable allowing your child to see any of these situations in real life? Of course the answer is no, so why allow them to see and hear these things on a computer?

Some studies have shown a direct link between children playing violent games and them behaving aggressively. It is becoming increasingly notable from the way children speak and play if they are exposed to such games and is a growing concern within our school.

Below is a guide to some popular social media platforms that you may find useful.



Instagram (age 13+) lets users snap, edit, and share photos and 15-second videos, either publicly or with a private network of followers. It also lets you apply fun filters and effects to your photos, making them look high quality and artistic.

What parents need to know:

- Children are on the lookout for "likes." Children may measure the "success" of their photos - even their self-worth (worryingly) by the number of likes or comments they receive.
- Public photos are the default. Photos and videos shared on Instagram are public unless privacy settings are adjusted.
- Private messaging is now an option. Instagram Direct allows users to send "private messages" to up to 15 mutual friends. These pictures don't show up on their public feeds.



Snapchat (age 13+) is a messaging app that lets users put a time limit on the pictures and videos they send before they disappear. Many young people use the app to share silly or embarrassing photos without the risk of them going public. However, there are lots of opportunities to use it in other ways.

What parents need to know:

- It's a myth that Snapchats go away forever. Whenever an image is sent, it remains part of their digital footprint.
- It can make sending inappropriate images/messages seem OK. The seemingly risk-free messaging may actually encourage users to share pictures which they know they shouldn't.



Discord is a free app for mobile and PC that lets people chat via text, voice, or video in real time. It's an easy-to-use group-chatting tool for friends. Discord requires that users be at least 13 years old, although they do not verify users' age upon sign-up.

What parents need to know:

- The safest way to use Discord is to only accept friend requests and participate in private servers with people you already know.
- There is an 'open chat' option which means you could be talking to strangers from anywhere around the world. It is advisable to avoid this option.



WhatsApp (age 16+) users send text messages, audio messages, videos, and photos to one or many people with no message limits or fees.

What parents need to know:

- It can be pushy. After you sign up, it automatically connects you to all the people in your address book who also are using WhatsApp. It encourages you to add friends who haven't signed up yet.

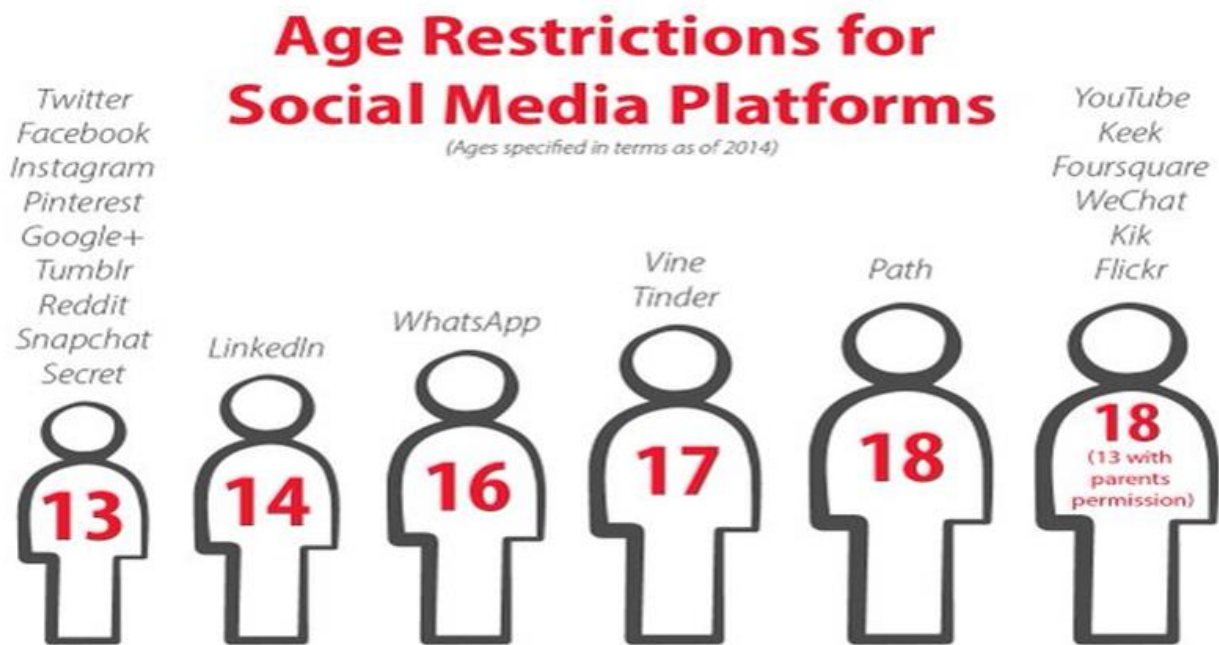


Skype (age 13+) is a computer programme and app, which lets you make audio and video calls to other users around the world. You can also send instant messages.

What parents need to know:

- It can be difficult to adjust the privacy settings
- It's difficult to work out how to report or block
- Information on keeping safe online isn't prominent on the site.
